The Ocean Watch Foundation offers monthly two-tank reef dives for only \$15 to divers willing to be trained to count and report on our local marine crit-

Meet at Nova Southeastern University inside John U. Lloyd Park at 9 AM on Sunday, March 18. Your day starts with a 2-1/2 hour course on identifying and counting reef fish, corals, and marine invertebrates. After lunch, ride out to the reef on the charter boat "American Dream" for a two tank dive, actually identifying and collecting valuable scientific data on the animals you have just learned about. I magine a whole day of learning and fun all for only \$15!

Ocean Watch has six "monitoring points" along the Broward County coast that will be visited on a quarterly basis. The data collected from each dive will be made available to all members of the scientific community and environmental awareness organizations. The fish-monitoring project is being done using the Reef Environmental Education Foundation (REEF) Roving Diver Technique. This project was developed in 1990 with support from The Nature Conservancy and guidance by the National Marine Fisheries Service.

The REEF Fish Survey Project allows volunteer SCUBA divers and snorkelers to collect and report information on marine fish populations using a fun and easy standardized method. The data is housed in a publicly accessible database on REEF's website (http:// www.reef.org) and is regularly used by a variety of resource agencies and researchers.

Book review:

Deadly Depths

The Last Dive: A Father and Son's Fatal Descent in the Ocean's Depths, by Bernie Chowdhury. HarperCollins Publishers, Inc., 2000.

This real-life story is a "must read" for all agua-holics, especially advanced divers. It is the story of father-and-son dive team Chris and Chrissy Rouse, avid cave and wreck divers who ultimately perished from the bends while trying to discover the identity of a sunken German submarine off the New York coast. You won't be able to put this action-packed story down once you pick it up—it is more exciting than any adventure fiction I've ever read.

Chowdhury, a friend of the Rouses, an avid wreck diver, and a survivor of a nearly fatal bends hit, has melded many different stories into one. You will get to know the Rouses, who became so obsessed with diving that they advanced from quarry divers to technical divers in less than four years. You will learn about the history of diving, from Aristotle's diving bell to Sheck Exley's mixed gasses and exotic gear configurations. The effects of pressure and various gas mixtures on the body are covered in detail, but written in layman's terms. The book is a veritable "Who's Who" of technical divers and "What's What" of famous wrecks, like the Andrea Doria and the U-352. This exciting book, which includes several photographs, will make you look at diving safety in a whole new light. The Website of the Month column on page 4 features many related websites.
